Message from the Chair of the HVRA Board

Dear members of this fine Harbord Village community:

Again I have to report the HVRA board has outdone itself this past half year in producing some seriously wonderful new projects.

The Treeing the Village group has completed the inventory of the trees in Harbord Village, a massive task that required the work of just under 100 volunteers. In addition, the group has embarked on an ambitious task of treeplanting in rear yards and is working on a scheme of having members of Harbord Village 'adopt' trees in public spaces with a view to tracking



health and making sure there is adequate water for the trees. It is an extraordinary initiative by any measure, and I am pretty certain it has not been duplicated on this scale by a residents' group anywhere.

The Farmers' Market has proved to be a roaring success. We have had weekly markets [Wed. 3-7 p.m.] in the Green P parking lot south of Bloor between Borden and Lippincott. The food one can buy simply cannot be beat in terms of flavour and freshness and variety. Prices are perhaps slightly higher than your supermarket, but the quality is worth the difference, plus it's great to see

the same faces every week bringing their wares, so much so they've become "our" farmers. And I see the way our community comes out, interacts, meets, greets and schmoozes. Every one of those encounters makes us a stronger community.



As you all know, we had to cancel the Fall Fair this year for the first time in 16 years. Hurricane lke was threatening us with 100 mm of rain, so we thought it best not to waste HVRA resources taking a chance that we would lose some \$1,500 on non-refundables.

With the many donations from our local merchants, we will hold the traditional Fall Fair silent auction at a new event, the Pumpkin Festival on Harbord Street, on November 1.

Your Pumpkins on Harbord Street on November 1st

"Our hope is that 200 lit pumpkins will grace sidewalk tables on both sides of the street from Brunswick to Spadina." Now's the time to buy a

pumpkin from local merchants and think about the design you might carve into the front of it. That way, after celebrating Halloween, you'll be able to bring your carved pumpkin to Harbord Street, 5-6 p.m., to participate in The Great Harbord Street Pumpkin Festival.

In this, the first year of the festival, HVRA will supply the candles and the Harbord Business Improvement Association (HBIA) the tables. Our hope is that 200 lit pumpkins will grace sidewalk tables on both sides of the street from Brunswick to Spadina. If the City turns off the low-hanging

street lights, and local residents leave their porch lights off, the effect of the lit pumpkins will be alluring.

Spearheading the effort has been the HBIA's Neil Wright. He's arranged for notables such as Molly Johnson and Christie Blatchford to create designs for large celebrity pumpkins that will be carved by Central Tech students and placed on each corner. Local restaurants will feature pumpkin on their menus.


Between 5:30 and 9:30 on Saturday, November 1, invite

Harvesting Harbord Village fruit

There are a surprising number of apple, pear, cherry, peach and apricot trees in our downtown neighbourhood. A few date back to the 1880s when the area was reportedly full of small orchards. Besides fruit trees, we also have dozens of grape arbours that produce heavily each September.

Some of this bounty is picked and consumed—by humans and wildlife—but much of it falls to the ground and rots.

A new community group, Not Far From the Tree, sees this as a community-building opportunity. Their volunteers will pick your fruit, leave you with one-third, keep one-third for themselves and donate the remainder to a food kitchen or shelter.

Register with your Harbord Village address to enjoy their discounted services. If they can visit a number of properties in the neighbourhood in one day, you'll avoid paying additional travel costs.

Note that the company can also provide advice and care on trees located on the city-owned portion of your front yard, if you fill out a city form in advance of having the work done.

And this winter, they will

conduct a safety audit of all the trees in the neighbourhood.

Let's hear it for the solaristas!

Two years of dedicated effort by members of the Downtown West Solar Energy project have resulted in 40 system installations, including 13 photovoltaic systems and 27 solar hot water systems.

Six of our participants have gone solar in a big way, purchasing both PV and hot water systems.

It's estimated that the solar hot water systems are now generating approximately 104,000 kW-hrs equivalent of energy and displacing 36 tonnes of carbon dioxide annually.

The PV (i.e. solar electric) systems are generating approximately 30,000 kW-hrs of electricity and displacing 29 tonnes of carbon dioxide annually.

Installing solar panels on your

house isn't just good for the planet – it's good for the soul, as these project participants and Harbord Village residents attested:

"Getting my solar panels was the single best decision I have made in my life. It is unequivocally thrilling to be able to help the planet. We solaristas are bound to the solar system and each other in a powerful and moving way! Thanks Downtown West," said Sue Dexter.

"I am amazed at how happy it has made me just to order a solar hot water system. It makes me feel as if I am moving in the right direction. It makes me very happy to know that my neighbours are organizing to help me in this way and to relieve me of all the confusion and doubt that prevented me from investigating on my own," said Harriet

Friedman.

While the project has been a great success, project activity has slowed to a trickle, so we have decided to wind down the project.

Thanks are due to the entire Downtown West team, including the homeowners who have purchased systems, our hard-working committee members, all local residents who came to meetings to learn about solar energy systems for their homes, our fine vendors Solera Sustainable Energy and Goldwater Solar Systems, and our bright and shiny co-chairs Tim Grant and David Booz.

Backyard trees for only \$20!

Last spring, some of your neighbours received a tree worth \$100-\$200 for only \$20! Thanks to funding from the Toronto Parks and Trees Foundation, you too can receive one or more trees for your backyard for the same price. Our volunteers will even plant your tree for you on Saturday, October 25th, if you need help.

To obtain a backyard tree this fall, contact Samiha Sayed at samsayed@aol.com or 416.531.8651 no later than September 26th. While we will try to obtain any native tree species you want, the following ones are recommended as well adapted for city growing conditions:

LARGE (may grow to 16 metres high): American Basswood (Linden), Ginkgo, Ken-

tucky Coffee Tree, Red Oak, Black Locust

MEDIUM (10-15 m): Black Cherry, Bur Oak, Northern Catalpa, Ruby-Red Horse Chestnut, Sweet Gum, White Spruce

SMALL (-10 m): Serviceberry, White Cedar

Planting more trees will help us increase our lovely tree canopy, improve the environment by cleaning the air, and reduce storm water runoff that overloads storm sewers. Please encourage your neighbours to take advantage of this offer.

Tree mapping in Harbord Village

If you like trees, you can now go on a tree ride around Harbord Village, courtesy of Google Maps.

The trees page of the HVRA website (www.harbordvillage.com/trees) contains a set of links that will zoom you down from space into the HVRA treetops and give you a lot of information along the way.

The summer 2007 inventory does that for about half the blocks in the neighbourhood, and the summer 2008 inventory will soon complete the picture — thanks to the work of HVRA volunteers and the two U of T Forestry graduate students who guided their work and compiled the data.

Each tree on the Harbord Vil-

lage map shows up as a pushpin with a "bubble" note about the tree's species, size and condition.

The notes follow Professor Andy Kenney's Neighbourwood system for tree analysis.

For your tree ride, you need first to download the free Google Earth software from http://earth.google.com/. Install it and open it in a window of its own.

Open the HVRA Trees page (www.harbordvillage.com/trees) in its own window and scroll down a couple of screens until you see the link saying "Google Earth Maps." Click on it to see a list of maps. The ones there now represent the 2007 inventory. The 2008 maps will soon appear to complete the set.

Choose a map and click on it. Google Earth will take over to open it for you, zooming you down towards the globe at until you start to recognize the grid of HVRA streets, speckled over with the Neighbourwood pushpins.

Each file represents a block, numbered according to Julie's system for dividing up the neighbourhood, and each pushpin represents a tree.

Click on the pushpins to read the notes.
